FROM OUR
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear friends and supporters,

Like many organizations working in the nonprofit sector in 2025, we faced unprecedented challenges with the withdrawal of federal grants, staffing challenges with our federal partners, policy shifts and a prolonged federal shutdown. These changes have been disruptive to our work and the loss of funding has resulted in fewer projects in the field and fewer members hired. Even so, we are especially proud to share that we navigated these constraints without a single layoff or furlough – an outcome that reflects careful stewardship, adaptability, and a deep commitment to our members and mission.

Despite these challenges, the season was also marked by meaningful growth and momentum. We broke ground on a new Taos office building that will strengthen our infrastructure and expand what's possible for programs in the years ahead. We launched a Youth Council made up of high school students through our Prevention Program, ensuring that young voices are helping shape the work designed to serve them. And our Conservation Program delivered an exceptional year of performance – and our Conservation Program delivered an exceptional year, marked by expanded saw certifications, a leading backcountry program statewide, and the strongest partner feedback in our organization's history. These accomplishments are a testament to our dedicated staff's will to really dig in, despite the challenges we face.

This annual report tells the fuller story of a year defined not only by obstacles, but by perseverance, progress, and impact. We invite you to dig in, celebrate what we accomplished together, and look ahead with us. And as we prepare for another strong season, keep an eye out for our crews in 2026 – we can't wait for another fabulous season, doing the work that matters most.

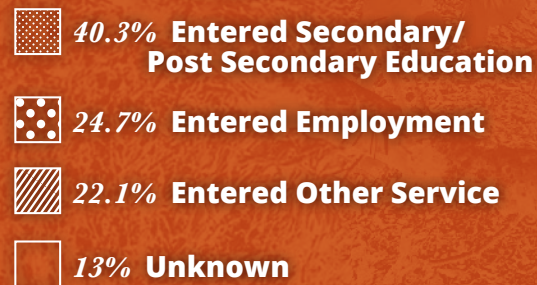
In 2025, 92 corpsmembers contributed 70,607 hours of service while earning more than \$1.3 million in living stipends and education awards.

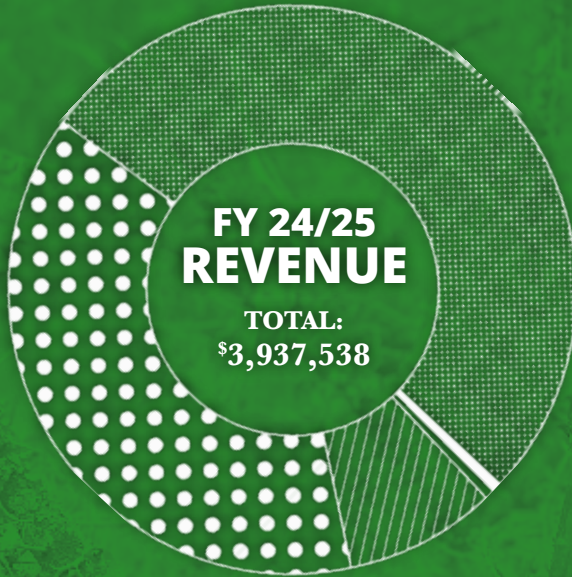

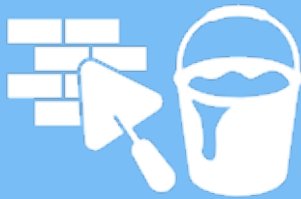

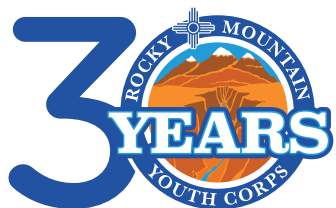
